



Water supply in three Togolese villages

Background information

Despite efforts by the Togolese government and other organizations to improve the supply of portable water, access to drinking water remains a major problem in the regions Savanes, Central and Northern Plateau in Togo. These regions are also highly exposed to the effects of climate change, in form of increased drought and unpredictable rainfall patterns. Women are forced to walk an average of 2 km to reach the nearest source of potable water or use polluted water from dams. Due to these challenges, three villages have been identified to help them with access to drinking water.

These villages are Namare/Puob-n-kpaad (NAKI OUEST, SAVANES), Tchokoroko (WELLY, CENTRALE) and Aloba (GAME, PLATEAU-NORD).

The project is supported and coordinated by NSCT, a limited company with different shareholders (51% owned by the Singaporean OLAM International Group, 25% by the National Federation of Cotton Producers Group (FNGPC), and 24% by the Togolese government).

Project Outputs

During the project period, the three planned boreholes were drilled, installed and equipped with Human Power Pumps (HPPs).

Sustainability will be ensured through the establishment of a borehole management committee in each community. This committee will be responsible for the management and maintenance of the boreholes and will rely on a fund raised from small contributions from community members to ensure the maintenance of the boreholes and the promotion of preventive measures against waterborne disease. In addition, the management committee will receive WASH training, as well as training in equipment management and financial management, so that they can share their knowledge to community members.

One month after the beneficiaries were able to use the water from the boreholes, NSCT conducted a small survey in the community to determine the changes brought about by the work. Access to drinking water is a major step forward in health:

- Drinking and cooking water significantly reduces the incidence of diarrheal diseases, especially among children.
- Personal hygiene and washing clothes in clean, abundant water are important factors in reducing skin diseases.
- Fatigue and pain from carrying water, especially for women, are reduced.

"My name is LAMBONI Lady, I am 25 years old and there are eight members in my household. I would like to thank NSCT and my colleagues for their efforts. With this borehole, we have an easy access to drinking water, which was difficult to get before. When we came back from the field, we had to go to a water point and stand in a long queue to get a small amount of water for the family. But today I have water in quantity, quality and close to my home. I can only thank God and the donors and pray that the cotton production will develop, so that I can get more help from the NSCT."
